WHEN THE Pinelands Creative Workshop (PCW) performs this time around, it will be to the dedication of Black freedom fighters

The event will be the staging of Dedication which will be held at the Parkinson Memorial Secondary School, Pine, St. Michael, April 8 to 9, from 6 p.m. Sharing the stage with PCW will be their guests the Malik

Folk Performers, the Trinidadian theatre group. Other guest performers will

include the Country Theatre Workshop, the Luther Thorne School, the Sargeants Village Dancers and Archie and Peter Pan.

To the praise and honour of fallen heroes, the group eu-logises through a quotation from Roscoe Jamison: These truly are the brave, these

men who cast aside old memo-ries, to walk the blood-stained path of sacrifice ... to suffer and to die for freedom when their own is yet denied.

It is for this reason they re member the contributions of Dr. Walter Rodney, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Marcus Garvey, Errol Barrow, Maurice

Bishop, Bob Marley and Cle-ment Payne. Further, they will pay spe-cial tribute to Nelson Mandela, incarcerated in South Africa for over 25 years. No women were featured.

The printed programme/ ticket listed the following quo-tations from these men:

Dr. Rodney: "African peoples have an ancestral dignity which they must rediscover and keep alive.'

Marcus Garvey: "Up you mighty race! You can accom-plish what you will. . . No one knows when the hour of Afri-ca's redemption cometh. One day like a storm, it will be here"



Maurice Bishop: "These peo-ple clearly understand that the aims and objectives of the re-volution are to create a new and better life, for a new and conscious people, to live in a new and progressive Grenada, which we are trying to build." Clement Payne: "Remember to keep the lights always burn-ing, continue to hold mass

meetings, organise, educate, agitate, but do not violate." And Mandela: "South Africa

belongs to its people." With the help of Maria Elias, the group was able to mount a

photographic and literary dis-play of the life and work of these heroes.

These men's life stories will further be told in dance movements choreographed by Jef-frey "Ife" Wilkinson, who has been taking the 70 dancers (from ages 4 to over 20s) through their paces since mid-January

Hamilton Lashley, public relations officer of the PCW, said of the Trinidadian group's participation, that since both organisations shared similar philosophies, it was easy for the visitors to fit into the programme.

The relationship between the two groups developed last October when the PCW visited Trinidad on a cultural ex-change programme facilitated by Barbados' High Commis-sioner to Trinidad and Tobago and the Eastern Caribbean, Frank DaSilva.

The PCW was invited, in turn, by the Malik Folk Per-formers to its tenth anniver-sary celebrations last December. Later this year, the local group will return to the Land of the Humming Bird to make guest appearances in the Best Village Competition with its acclaimed village life. This weekend's performaces
